To affect leadership, one must adjust his or her own behavior in order to get others to change or adjust their behavior. Therefore, the leader, rather than those being led, must be the primary adjustor.

The successful leader learns quickly that it is he or she who must make adjustments to compensate for the strengths, weaknesses, beliefs, opinions, and behaviors of those being led. It is only by using our knowledge about human behavior and the individuals being led often making adjustments that we are allowed to cause others to want our leadership. That is a fact. Therefore, the leader must always make the first move and keep making the first move. If we wait for those being led to change an attitude or behavior before we act, nothing may be the result.

When the leader does not make technical and behavioral adjustments, those being led are seldom motivated to change or achieve. The leadership attitude that I'm the boss, and that is the way it is going to be only promotes superiority and resistance. It only makes people fight or pull away. It seldom brings those being led closer to the leader or stimulates or motivates them to follow.

If we think of ourselves as the primary adjustors in all situations, we have the foundation tools needed for effective leadership. If we don't, those we lead do not have a leader. They only have a boss. There is a significant difference. And if we are only a boss, we'll have to keep our foot on people continually. It is very hard to get any job done effectively if one foot always has to remain in one place to control those being led.
